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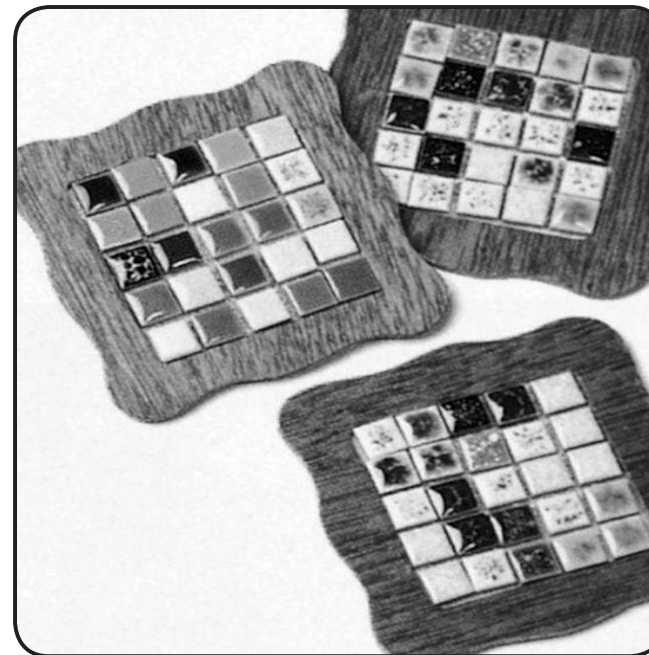

**PROJECT TIME: 45 minutes**

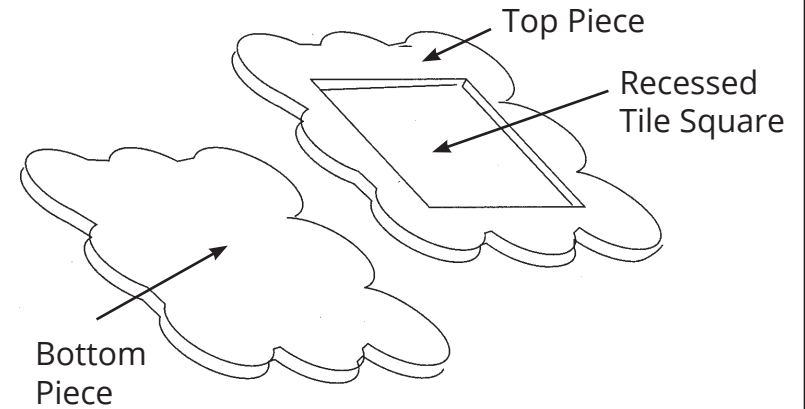
## INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Everyone will start with one complete wood coaster, that's made up of two parts. One piece with a recessed square on the front side (top piece) and the 2nd piece is plain on both sides (bottom piece) (see Figure A).
2. Pop out the center from the top piece (the center square of wood is not needed).
3. Lay the top piece on the table and try all 25 tiles in the center to see if they all fit. If they do not, then the inside corners of the trivet need to be sanded down until the tiles do fit. This is also the time to plan out your tile design before it's glued in place.
4. Line up the sides and glue the two pieces of your coaster together (see Figure A). Let dry.

**TIP:** Place a heavy object like a book on top to keep the pieces together while drying.

5. Apply glue with the brush or your fingers inside the recessed area of the coaster (see figure B) and spread onto the entire area.
6. Press the tiles in place in rows of five. Let dry.
7. Wipe any excess glue from the tops of the tiles with a damp cloth or towel. Your tiny tile trivet is done! Great job!
