Assembly and Use of your Puppet Theaters

- 1. Carefully separate all the printed components from the cardboard sheets. The very large sheet of heavy cardboard is to be used as your Puppet Theater and stage.
- 2. Use the supplied crayons to decorate all the components of your project. You can also use your own colored pencils or markers for decoration. Use your own creativity!
- 3. After decorating all the components you are ready to assemble the theater. Fold the large cardboard component to resemble the picture on the package. After assembling, it is best to use glue on all the tabs for a permanent stage.
- 4. Take the wooden sticks and glue to the back of each character. Be sure to have the sticks stick out from the bottom of the character so you can easily use the puppet.
- 5. Depending on the theme of your puppet show, "community" or "fantasy," slide the scenic decorative card into the top of the theater.

FINAL INSTRUCTIONS:

You are ready to create your own show. The children can have a meeting to determine what their play/story should be. This is great fun to plan your show!

In addition to planning the story line, the children will determine what character or characters each one will have.

Once all the details are worked out, the participants can sit behind the theater and start their performance!
